In 2019 Canberra Grammar School commenced the Indigenous Scholars Programme, inviting families from the South Coast of NSW to apply for boarding scholarships. This brought together students from Kiama, Ulladulla, Nowra and Wreck Bay to join Indigenous students from the local Canberra region.

ABOUT CANBERRA GRAMMAR SCHOOL

Established in 1929, Canberra Grammar School (CGS) is a co-educational Independent Anglican school offering outstanding academic education, co-curricular opportunities and pastoral care to day and boarding students of all backgrounds and faiths within a community guided by Christian values.

CGS is the only co-educational boarding school in the ACT, and the only school in the ACT to offer the NSW Higher School Certificate. In 2011 CGS also became an International Baccalaureate World School, and now offers the Diploma Programme (Year 11 and 12) and Primary Years Programme (Early Years to Year 6).

We provide a dynamic, future-focussed international education with access to world-class opportunities, grounded in social awareness and responsibility. As we look to the century ahead, we aspire for our students to be leaders of their generation and ready for the world.

Building on the professional expertise of its staff, the commitment of its community and the resources of the nation's capital, Canberra Grammar School aspires to be the most dynamic and distinctive centre of learning in Australia.

WHY DOES CGS **OFFER AN INDIGENOUS SCHOLARS PROGRAMME?**

Canberra Grammar School envisions a possible future in which Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander children have the same chances and opportunities as non-Indigenous children. The School recognises our position in being able to affect equity and equal opportunity by welcoming Indigenous Scholars to the School community each year through the Indigenous Scholars Programme.

Our Indigenous Scholars have the opportunity to be ambassadors for their cultural heritage, to take pride in their Aboriginal identity and to share their knowledge with other students in the hope of reconciling the past with an optimistic future. We recognise the transformative power of a world-class education and the impact this can have on the community and societal outcomes across Indigenous and non-Indigenous settings.

The School seeks to reconcile our young history with the ancient cultural heritage of the Ngunnawal people on whose land our School stands. We seek to do this through recognition and understanding of history and through the integration of traditional culture and knowledge of Country in pursuit of a collaborative and equitable future for Australia.

We acknowledge that it is not possible to alter the past, and we pay respect to the trauma inflicted upon Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people. We seek to reconcile ourselves with the past so that history is not repeated. Not everything can be resolved overnight. However, education is the key to enacting change, and Canberra Grammar School is in a position to enable change through its role as an educational facility and pillar of the community.



CULTIVATING AN INCLUSIVE COMMUNITY

Canberra Grammar School aims to cultivate an inclusive community where students and staff of all backgrounds and faiths can learn together. As educators, we continue to seek guidance from our local Indigenous elders to develop mutually respectful relationships with the local community. We work with young people, and our commitment is to ignite a sense of hope and imagination in all our students to imagine a future in which they have agency to affect positive change.


The Indigenous Scholars Support Team encourages the students to fully participate in the life of the School by immersing themselves in the comprehensive range of academic and active learning opportunities. Students are supported by a full-time Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Mentor and are encouraged to identify a secondary personal mentor to assist in their pastoral care. Through focussed tutoring and the mentorship process, students build confidence and find their voice. By sharing and speaking about their culture, they find their place and in so doing play an essential part in helping to cultivate broader understanding.

CGS is dedicated to creating a welcoming environment for our Indigenous Scholars, promoting anti-racism campaigns in the student body, taking part in cultural awareness training for staff, and implementing knowledge of traditional practices and histories into the curriculum. We work alongside parents of our Indigenous Scholars as partners, building positive connections with families by fostering mutually respectful relationships.

HOW THE SCHOOL SUPPORTS ITS SCHOLARS

Scholarship recipients will be supported to achieve in school, and to create pathways to further education and employment through:

- Engagement with confident and supportive educators. Staff provide a high level of support
 to students and their families, ensuring they feel safe and included in school life. Staff consider
 the holistic needs of the child, with high expectation of success, wellbeing and cultural needs a
 priority. Students develop leadership skills and are supported to be passionate advocates for
 and educators of their Indigenous culture and identity
- The provision of responsive learning environments. Mindful that individual needs are diverse and change over time, continuous monitoring is an integral component of the CGS Student Development Programme, ensuring that learning requirements are recognised and responded to
- Additional support when required. Students are provided increased access to learning and development programmes through the implementation of individualised learning plans, when necessary, that identify personalised support needed to participate fully in the learning programme. Families are invited to contribute to the development of individualised learning plans; and
- Extending the invitation to families to volunteer their expertise. Utilising the expertise of our community in the teaching and delivery of Aboriginal cultural knowledge and languages.



ELIGIBILITY & APPLICATION

Canberra Grammar School invites scholarship applications from Indigenous students who believe they would thrive in our environment. We envision these scholarships to be mutually beneficial, learning with and from one another.

Scholarships are awarded to students who show the potential to succeed, who demonstrate care and concern for the broader community, have a range of talents and interests, and are eager and ready to participate in and contribute to the CGS community. Those who have shown leadership ability and commitment to their education are encouraged to apply.

Applicants must be proud of their culture and have a desire to give back to the communities they are involved in.

Criteria

To be eligible for the Indigenous Scholars Programme, students should be:

- Of Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander heritage and eligible to receive ABSTUDY
- Receiving encouragement and support for their scholarship application
- · Committed to making some financial contribution towards expenses
- · Connected to community through sports, leadership or cultural programmes; and
- Respectful of the Christian ethos of the School Community.

Academic commitment must be demonstrated either in the application or interview process, including:

- Good homework habits
- · Sufficient literacy and numeracy skills to allow the student to cope with the study load
- Outstanding achievement in at least one area, including sport, drama, music, leadership and/or academic studies
- A commitment to staying at CGS until the end of Year 12
- A positive attitude to learning
- An ability to adjust to a new learning environment and high academic standards; and
- · An ability to relate well with people from many different backgrounds.

Successful students will be expected to:

- Maintain a high effort rating (above 80% based on CGS effort scoring)
- Maintain an excellent attendance record (above 90% based on CGS records)
- Maintain high behavioural standards
- Participate fully in a summer and winter co-curricular programme
- · Attend all School carnivals and relevant in-School events; and
- If boarding, live full-time in the boarding house, including weekends.



SCHOLARSHIP INFORMATION

In 2016 Canberra Grammar School partnered with the Podmore Trust to support the placement of our first Indigenous Scholar. In late 2018 administration of the Podmore Trust was handed over to the Canberra Grammar School Foundation – the philantrophic branch of the School – to continue its work in providing equitable opportunities for Indigenous students.

With the Podmore Trust established, it allowed the shared values, common interests and synergies of the two Foundations to work in parallel with the CGS Indigenous Scholars Programme. The CGS Foundation will continue the spirit of Podmore by returning opportunity to Indigenous children in the Canberra region by providing educational scholarships and access to leadership and sporting opportunities.

Two of the Indigenous Scholarships awarded are directly funded by the CGS Podmore Trust, and are named the 'CGS Podmore Warawitcha Scholarship' and the 'CGS Podmore Brigadier Damian Roche Memorial Scholarship'. The CGS Foundation facilitates the endowment of educational scholarships and access to leadership and sporting opportunities at our Red Hill campus for Indigenous students by subsidising academic and boarding fees for the full period of enrolment.

All selected scholarship recipients must be eligible for a full or part ABSTUDY allowance. Payment of the allowance is directed to the School to further cover tuition and boarding fees, with the remainder to be financed by a parental contribution. This financial obligation is a requirement of the programme as a demonstration of commitment to and support of the student's education at CGS.

The amount of the parental financial contribution is set by crosschecking the tax return from the previous year against the Scale of Parental Financial Contribution Schedule. The tax return must be provided to the School by 1 December before the start of the academic year.

Additional costs may be incurred by the parents for items such as social activities, musical instrument hire, and non-compulsory events and trips. A statement of account is sent each term via email detailing any fees and charges owing. A direct debit is required to be established and maintained with the School to cover these costs. Other personal costs, such as spending money, toiletries, hair-cuts, and phone bills, are to be covered by the family.

Administration of payment management is required to be authorised to the School when the Scholar starts at CGS.

All applications must include the following information:

- 1. A completed Scholarship Application Form
- 2. Copies of the student's two most recent school reports
- **3.** A copy of the student's most recent NAPLAN results
- 4. One personal reference which includes the referee's address and contact details
- **5.** One reference from a member of the student's Aboriginal or Torres Strait Island community which includes the referee's address and contact details
- 6. A copy of the student's birth certificate; and
- 7. Evidence of application for ABSTUDY.
